### **Academic Biography**

From 2003, when she completed her PhD (University of Amsterdam), until 2008, Eileen Moyer worked as the research manager and coordinator of the “Anthropology of AIDS in the 21st-Century” research group, based at the University of Amsterdam. This group, which she helped to establish with Anita Hardon, has been remarkably successful, earning multiple research grants and resulting in the completion of more than 15 PhD projects. Between 2004 and 2008 she coordinated the training of PhD researchers and the writing of research proposals, and organised international conferences. Since 2004 she has also coordinated and managed five externally funded, international research projects. Although her management position did not include research or writing time, she published three peer-reviewed articles and two book chapters from her PhD research during that period, while also gaining valuable managerial and supervisory experience.

In October 2008, Eileen Moyer was appointed Assistant Professor of medical and urban anthropology at the University of Amsterdam and, in 2009, received a four-year grant to direct a research team to investigate the social institutions and socialities that have arisen in eastern Africa in conjunction with the expansion of HIV treatment. She has published 28 peer-reviewed articles and co-edited three special issues in highly esteemed medical anthropology journals. She was granted tenure in October 2012 and promoted to the position of Associate Professor in 2016.

In 2015, she was awarded a prestigious ERC consolidator grant for two million euro to research the relationship between global health gender equality initiatives and transformations in urban African masculinities over the last quarter century. In addition to coordinating her team's research activities, she is currently supervising 14 PhD researchers and four post-doctoral researchers, and co-editing the journal *Medicine Anthropology Theory*, which she co-founded with Vinh-Kim Nguyen in 2014.

## Research Projects

Eileen Moyer currently directs the interdisciplinary research group, Gender, Health and Sexuality in Urban Africa. The team currently has more than 20 members who conduct research on the relationship between global health gender equality initiatives and transformations in urban African masculinities over the last quarter century in eastern and southern Africa. She is personally engaged in research tracking the life trajectories of a group of Tanzanian men she has followed for nearly two decades, and working on two book manuscripts: one based on her twenty years of researching community-based responses to HIV in Africa, and a second on gender and sexual violence in South Africa.

For her PhD research Eileen Moyer did extensive anthropological fieldwork on the social worlds and health concerns of urban street youth in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania. After completing her PhD, she conducted critical global health research, focusing on HIV-related care and treatment, sexual and reproductive health, and migrant populations. These studies involved anthropological fieldwork in diverse socio-cultural settings and at multiple levels: global, national and local. Most of her research has focused on eastern and southern Africa, but she has also worked in Haiti and China.

Eileen Moyer has also contributed to the development of community-level participatory research methodologies and frameworks for use in applied settings, and developed theoretical frameworks for analyzing the long-term societal impact of HIV on communities in high prevalence settings. She has also been involved in the training and guiding of researchers, and in the comparative analysis of results from multi-sited research.

In 2015, Eileen Moyer was awarded a prestigious 2 million Euro Consolidator Grant from the European Research Council to conduct research on urban masculinities in Tanzania, Kenya and South Africa through 2020.

Throughout her academic career, Eileen Moyer has written numerous successful grant proposals, securing external funding for a year-long language training program in Tanzania (Foreign Language Area Studies) and to conduct both MA (Ford Foundation, among others) and PhD field research in Tanzania (Fulbright-Hays, among others).

Since completing her PhD, in her capacity as research coordinator in the Anthropology of AIDS in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century research group, she has been actively involved in developing multiple successfully funded research proposals and was the main author on two successfully funded projects (SIDA and WOTRO-IP). In 2015, she was granted a Consolidator Grant from the European Research Council for her research project, *Becoming Men: Performing responsible masculinities in contemporary urban Africa*, as well as a small grant from AIDSfonds for preliminary research on HIV treatment preparedness for PREP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) in Amsterdam and The Hague.

Eileen Moyer has consistently received high teaching ratings from her students and supervisors. Currently, Eileen Moyer's primary management responsibilities at the University of Amsterdam focus on administration and supervision of her research group, Gender, Health and Sexuality in Urban Africa, which has a budget exceeding 2 million euro and more than 20 members, 15 of which are directly employed by the project. As the co-editor of the journal *Medicine Anthropology Theory*, she is also responsible for managing a team of 6 section editors, 2 editorial assistants, and rotating team of interns.

Throughout her career, she has been involved in organizing and hosting professional meetings and international conferences. In her capacity as research coordinator in the Anthropology of AIDS in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century research group she was the main organizer of six annual expert

meetings (2005-2010) hosted by the University of Amsterdam on HIV research, bringing together international social science, public health and medical specialists, national and global policy makers, representatives from affected communities, and junior scholars. She has also co-convened international conferences in Nairobi, Kenya, and Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, and organized a satellite session for the International Conference on AIDS and Sexually Transmitted Disease in Africa in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.
